A Non-Contemptuous Look At a Favorite AA Slogan

The quote attributed to Herbert Spencer, "Contempt prior to investigation", found in Appendix II Spiritual Experience in our Big Book, is arguably one of the most beloved and oft repeated lines of the book.

Yet there is some controversy and drama behind this famous reference. What is the work of an obscure 19th-century British philosopher doing in Alcoholics Anonymous?

The Big Book was written by a group of Americans, including Bill Wilson and other early members of AA (many relatively uneducated), and was published in 1938. The Spencer quotation is one of the few references to outside thinkers in the entire book. How did it get there?

It first appeared in the First Edition of the Big Book, as the introduction to the story by Ray C. (Ray Campbell) an artist who got sober through AA in 1938 and who was responsible for designing the first cover of Alcoholics Anonymous. He wrote the story "An Artist's Concept."

Probably 12-stepped by Bill Wilson himself, Camp-

bell relates that the next day he met 20 men who were staying sober in AA. Campbell, who had rejected religion as a cure for his drinking problem, was deeply moved by the group. "It was not so much what these men told me in regard to their experiences that was impressive as it was a sense or feeling that an invisible influence was at work," he wrote. Campbell's story was dropped from the second edition of the Big Book, but Bill Wilson salvaged the epigraph as an afterword to the new Appendix II.

Since 1939, over twenty million copies of Alcoholics Anonymous have been printed and, with each copy, another copy of this quotation attributed to Herbert Spencer. The quotation has since been used by a variety of authors. A variation has even appeared in one dictionary of quotations. On the Internet, new variations multiply and mutate. By now, the quotation is famous and has made the nearly forgotten Herbert Spencer famous in the 21st century for saying it.

But Herbert Spencer never wrote or said anything resembling this quotation.

It is derived from a Christian apologetic work by the 18th century British theologian William Paley. The variations of wording that have come down through the past two centuries only bear a skeletal resemblance to Paley's original meaning and form.

In A View of the Evidences of Christianity (1794), William Paley wrote: "The infidelity of the Gentile world, and that more especially of men of rank and learning in it, is resolved into a principle which, in my judgment, will account for the inefficacy of any argument, or any evidence whatever, viz.

contempt prior to examination."

In this context, Paley was trying to give reasons why the Christian faith was rejected by the ancient Greeks and Romans. He was trying to boil down the cause of their non-belief to a single principle.

Eighty-five years later, a Canadian named Rev. William H. Poole argued that the Anglo -Saxon race is actually descended from the ten lost tribes of Israel. On the title page of Anglo-Israel or, The British Nation: The Lost Tribes of Israel (1879), Poole attributes the following to Dr. Paley: "There is a principle which is a bar against all information, which is proof against all argument, and which cannot fail to keep a man in everlasting ignorance. This principle is, contempt prior to examination".

It may be impossible to trace a clear and contiguous lineage for this quotation. However, it is possible to identify recurring themes in the sources which use it. Appendix II is a redefinition of spiritual experiences as they are mentioned in the first phrase of AA's Twelfth Step: "Having had 'a spiritual awakening.'"

Concerned that others might think an experience like his own—a lightning flash and a stentorian voice from above—was a necessary entry to sobriety, Bill Wilson explained in Appendix II that spiritual experiences can

"develop over time." In fact, Bill wrote, anyone who is honest, willing and open to the idea of recovery has already had a kind of spiritual experience.

Contempt prior to investigation, he implies, is the only barrier to spiritual recovery. In fact, contempt prior to investigation is as much a symptom of alcoholism as cirrhosis of the liver, lying to your doctor or hiding the vodka bottle.

Who really came up with the phrase "contempt before investigation" and how it ended up in Appendix II in Alcoholics Anonymous may not matter much to anyone's actual recovery. Alcoholics love to scoff—at rules and regulations, at religion and God—until suddenly their lives are saved in spite of their scoffing. The quotation may be misattributed and mangled, but it still jumps off the page for anyone who thinks like an alcoholic. You read it. You see yourself. You know you are in the right place.

Interesting side note: William Spencer is credited with designing the precursor to the modern paperclip. He designed a wire contraption, more similar to a clothespin than a paperclip, for the purpose of securing his numerous documents. His design was gradually improved upon and has become one of the most ubiquitous of office supplies.

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On the First Step ...

The First Step ...

We admitted we were powerless over alcohol — that our lives had become unmanageable.

Bill W. on Tradition One, 1947

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Our whole AA program is securely founded on the principle of humility that is to say, perspective. Which implies, among other things, that we relate ourselves rightly to God and to our fellows; that we each see ourselves as we really are -- "a small part of a great whole". Seeing our fellows thus, we shall enjoy group harmony. That is why AA Tradition can confidently state, "Our common welfare comes first."

"Does this mean," some will ask, "that in AA the individual doesn't count too much? Is he to be swallowed up, dominated by the group?"

No, it doesn't seem to work out that way. Perhaps there is no society on earth more solicitous of personal welfare, more careful to grant the individual the greatest possible liberty of belief and action. Alcoholics Anonymous has no "musts." Few AA groups impose penalties on anyone for nonconformity. We do suggest, but we don't discipline. Instead, compliance or noncompliance with any principle of AA is a matter for the conscience of the individual; he is the judge of his own conduct. Those words of old time, "judge not," we observe most literally.

"But," some of us argue, "if AA has no authority to govern its individual members or groups, how shall it ever be sure that the common welfare does come first? How is it possible to be governed without a government? If everyone can do as he pleases, how can you have aught but anarchy?"

The answer seems to be that we AA's cannot really do as we please, though there is no constituted human authority to restrain us. Actually, our common welfare is protected by powerful safeguards. The moment any action seriously threatens the common welfare, group opinion mobilizes to remind us; our conscience begins to complain. If one persists, he may become so disturbed as to get drunk; alcohol gives him a beating. Group opinion shows him that he is off the beam, his own conscience tells him that he is dead wrong, and, if he goes too far, Barleycorn brings him real conviction.

So it is we learn that in matters deeply affecting the group as a whole, "our common welfare comes first." Rebellion ceases and cooperation begins because it must; we have disciplined ourselves.

Eventually, of course, we cooperate because we really wish to; we see that without AA there can be little lasting recovery for anyone. We gladly set aside personal ambitions whenever these might harm AA. We humbly confess that we are but "a small part of a great whole."

Tradition One...

Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends on AA unity.

The First Tradition Checklist ...

- 1. Am I in my group a healing, mending, integrating person, or am I divisive? What about gossip taking other members' inventories?
- 2. Am I a peacemaker? Or do I, with pious preludes such as "just for the sake of discussion," plunge into argument?
- 3. Am I gentle with those who rub me the wrong way, or am I abrasive?
- 4. Do I make competitive AA remarks, such as comparing one group with another or contrasting AA in one place with AA in another"
- 5. Do I put down some AA activities as if I were superior for not participating in this or that aspect of AA?
- 6. Am I informed about AA as a whole? Do I support, in every way I can, AA as a whole, or just the parts I understand and approve of?
- 7. Am I as considerate of AA members as I want them to be of me?
- 8. Do I spout platitudes about love while indulging in and secretly justifying behavior that bristles with hostility?
- 9. Do I go to enough AA meetings or read enough AA literature to really keep in touch?
- 10.Do I share with AA all of me, the bad and the good, accepting as well as giving the help of fellowship?
