David's Story

We Buried Him Today

We buried him today. The County Coroner had published the required notices for next of kin capable of fighting back, of taking care of itself, and nobody had claimed the body. It was just myself and his sponsor, not even a preacher, the county doesn't pay for those.

Not much of a send-off, and not the one David had asked for. A cheap coffin, a backhoe dug the hole, and that was it - another old AA

He had been sober for over 20 years, and in AA for over 30. A stern and rigid man, he tried to soften his edges but never could.

He was a loner, living on the fringes, an isolated man at the edge of life's good things. He hung in there... and in the end hung himself. I don't know why; I can't know.

I know there had been a diagnosis of senile dementia, and I know that the doctor had added cancer to the list. But I've seen AAs deal with such things before...I don't know why David decided he couldn't.

It isn't the first time I've been through this in Alcoholics Anonymous. I've known several over the years who just up and walked out life's door one day. Sober, but not happy. Sober, but not at peace. Sober, but they died of alcoholism. Our disease doesn't need us to drink in order to kill us. I wish more folks knew that ... and appreciated it.

Alcoholism is the only disease that is entirely and of emerging in new places and in new forms when it isn't properly treated. That's the spiritual malady, the real issue we are dealing with.

Most people think that has something to do with prayer or with God. It doesn't. It has to do with our spirit - that force which animates, motivates and propels us.

As an alcoholic, my spirit is ill. It is flawed. My character, or basic nature, doesn't work right. At its root, it is a fundamental and unresolvable insecurity - a hole that can't ever be filled.

It is an instinct run rampant, a desperate need for acceptance and love that cannot be met. It hurts. It fills me with fear. The selfishness and self-centeredness of the alcoholic lies here - we are totally preoccupied with what is going on with ourselves on the inside.

The slings and arrows of experience warped by this need, drive us to the edge of life, and the voices of the committee in our head keep us there.

We are obsessed with ourselves, and from this condition of mind.... the insanity of feelings gone haywire, we become desperate for relief. We discover alcohol or something else... and the stuff quiets the voices, provides the relief we've never

been able to find in any other way. It isn't any wonder we drink or drug the way we do.

And some of us don't develop an addiction ... in attempting to meet these crying demands, our spirit becomes sicker. We develop distorted beliefs, maladaptive behaviors, and eventually suffer in a hundred different ways.

God broke David's obsession to drink. But I don't think David ever truly understood his disease. I say that because I watched him struggle with those old unresolved issues of his heart for years. His rigidity, coldness, aloofness, isolation and

Alcoholism didn't need David to drink in order to continue trying to kill him and, in the end, it succeeded. In the end, instead of self-abandonment David abandoned hope ... and discovered a bitter end. But make no mistake: David died from untreated alcoholism.

Our recovery from alcoholism through the Steps must be a three-fold process. It is not one dimensional. When we in AA say that we have a circle and triangle... Recovery, Unity, Service ... we mean it.

In working the Steps, I clear a pathway for two purposes;

First, to come into a group of human people and away from the fringe of society where I have spent most of my emotional life.

Secondly, to discover "belonging" through service to God and to the people within that group. It is only this entire, threefold process that heals. It is especially true for those of us who suffer from the spiritual malady to a great degree.

Perhaps the 12th Step says it best:
"Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these Steps (recovery), we tried to carry this message to other alcoholics (service) and practice these principles in all our affairs (unity)."

You see... I cannot hold back. I must not continue to suffer that shyness, aloneness, that overwhelming sense of self in my affairs.

I must get involved in a group of people to practice these principles in all my affairs.

Only the total approach is healing. Anything less is little more than driving my disease deeper into the shadows, and, if I do that, it will continue to eat away, trying to destroy me.

It destroyed David. This is a memorial to an old AA who gave his best shot, and I think David ended up on the plus side. It wasn't his fault; he seemed to have been born that way.

David's Story has been shared within AA for a while. Our Contributor adds:

There were a lot of old ideas about self that David could never muster the willingness to let go of. He is at rest now.

But our literature says that "no matter how far down the scale we have gone, we will see how our experience can benefit others." David cannot speak of his experience any longer; I am speaking in his memory. And I think that, if David could talk to us today, he'd say "Understand your disease thoroughly, and work the complete program of recovery!"

TWO PERSPECTIVES - WHICH ONE ARE YOU?

Don D. went to an AA meeting one evening. He frowned when a member mispronounced a few words while reading "How It Works." He was appalled when another member stood up and said he was an alcoholic and an addict, he rolled his eyes, and grunted under his breath, loud enough for others to hear him. Another person talked too long. As he slipped out the door immediately after the meeting, Don D. muttered, "That was terrible. I should have stayed home."

Bob M. went to an AA meeting one evening. He was grateful as he made rounds, shaking hands and hugging both new and old members. His head was bowed as he listened prayerfully to the "Preamble" and "How It Works." His eyes moistened as he listened intently to a member tell his story. He felt blessed for being able to attend this meeting. After cleanup and a little socializing, he paused, and as he headed toward his car, his thoughts were, "Thank God for the privilege to be a member of the blessed fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous."

Both AA members were at same meeting. Each found what he was looking for.



The Fifth Step ...

Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.

The Fifth Step Principle ...

The principle behind the Fifth Step is Integrity.

A Fifth Step Prayer ...

God, I thank you from the bottom of my heart that I know you better. Help me become aware of anything I have omitted discussing with another person. Help me to do what is necessary to walk a free man at last.

On the Fifth Step ...

The Fifth Tradition ...

Each group has but one primary purpose — to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

My Fifth Tradition Checklist ...

- 1. Do I ever cop out by saying, "I'm not a group, so this or that Tradition doesn't apply to me"?
- 2. Am I willing to explain firmly to a newcomer the limitations of AA help, even if he gets mad at me for not giving him a loan?
- 3. Have I today imposed on any AA member for a special favor or consideration simply because I am a fellow alcoholic?
- 4. Am I willing to twelfth-step the next newcomer without regard to whom or to what is in it for me?
- 5. Do I help my group in every way I can to fulfill our primary purpose?
- 6. Do I remember that AA old-timers, too, can be alcoholics who still suffer? Do I try both to help them and to learn from them?
