Source of AA's remarkable success? Attraction, not Promotion

AA's policy of attraction has produced some remarkable results over the years. The recognition AA has recieved has been unsolicited and comes as the result of our collective and indidual commitment to the Twelve Traditions. Our Traditions were the creation of our co-founder, Bill W., the most unlikely source of such powerful, selfless principles.

Bill Wilson was a shameless self promoter, making millions of dollars on Wall Street, stating frequently of his desire to be the "Number One Man", aggressively trying to sell his ideas and schemes to anyone who would listen. We can read of Bill's history in his story in the Big Book. As Alcoholics Anonymous grew, Wilson became its principal symbol. He helped create a governing structure for the program, the General Service Board, and then turned over his power. "I have become a pupil of the A.A. movement rather than the teacher," he wrote. A smoker into his 70s, he died of pneumonia and emphysema in Miami, where he went for treatment in 1971. To the end, he clung to the principles and the power of anonymity. He was always Bill W., refusing to take money for counseling and leadership. He turned down many honors, including a degree from Yale. And he declined an offer from Time Magazine to put him on the cover--even

with his back turned. On June 14, 1999, under the category of HEROES & ICONS, Bill Wilson was again recognized by Time Magazine in it's list of the 100 Greatest Persons of the Century. Some other names on that list include the likes of Mother Teresa, Helen Keller, Anne Frank, Rosa Parks, Charles Lindbergh, and Muhammad Ali. This tremendous honor was achieved witout any promotion, after his death, and I imagine if Bill were still alive, he would have turned down the honor.

In June of 2012, The Library of Congress opened an exhibition celebrating "Books That Shaped America," a display of 88 books that they've deemed to have the most influence on American culture. Here is a press release from The Library of Congress about one of the books included in that exhibition:

(NEW YORK) – It's never been on The New York Times Best Seller list. Yet the "Big Book," A.A. members' fond name for the book Alcoholics Anonymous, is now designated by the Library of Congress as one of the 88 "Books That Shaped America," and is included in the library's new exhibition.

While we cannot know what impact A.A.'s basic

with the Lasker Award. The Lasker Awards have been awarded annually since 1945 to living persons who have made major contributions to medical science or who have performed public service on behalf of medicine. The Lasker Award has gained a reputation for identifying future winners of the Nobel Prize. Eighty-six Lasker laureates have received the Nobel Prize, including 32 in the last two decades.

That same year, The Grapevine printed a statement concerning this award:

No AA anywhere can be unmindful of the tremendous significance to himself and to the 'millions who don't yet know' of this, the greatest public honor to come to AA thus far. We re also grateful to the Lasker Committee for the manner of its presentation. Bernard L. Smith:, non-alcoholic Chairman of our Foundation, accepted and Bill (introduced anonymously as an early member) responded. Thus AA had been accorded national recognition... and our Eleventh Tradition had not only been preserved but had been underlined with the quiet dignity of AA self-

lessness.

And finally, we of Alcoholics Anonymous believe that the principle of anonymity has an immense spiritual significance. It reminds us that we are to place principles before personalities; that we are actually to practice a genuine humility. This to the end that our great blessings may never spoil us; that we shall forever live in thankful contemplation of Him who presides over us all.

textbook, Alcoholics Anonymous, has had in shaping America, we do know that the Big Book has helped millions of men and women throughout the world, and in all walks of life, find a new and satisfying way of life without alcohol. The Big Book describes the A.A. program of action for recovery from alcoholism. It has offered convincing evidence to relatives and friends that alcoholics can recover; and has furnished revealing insights to physicians, psychologists, members of the clergy and other professionals who work with alcoholics.

Although no author is listed, it is common

knowledge that the initial draft of the Big Book was written by A.A. co-founder Bill W. when he was not quite four years sober. But he did not complete it alone. Alcoholics Anonymous was a collective creation, since each chapter was "edited" by A.A. members in Akron, Ohio and New York City—all of them sober less time than Bill. This cooperative effort, reflecting the shared experience and consensus of the small Fellowship as a whole, set in motion the democratic process of decision-making that characterizes A.A. today.

The book provided the name for a small movement with nearly 100 members. It

took 36 years to sell the first million copies. Yet today, every year approximately one million copies of the Big Book are distributed in the English language alone (it is translated into 67 languages), and A.A. membership has grown over two million with a presence in more than 170 countries. In 2010, the thirty-millionth copy was presented to the American Medical Association, which declared alcoholism an illness in 1956.

On October 30, 1951, in San Francisco, Alcoholics Anonymous was presented

Full Text of the 1951 Lasker Award

The American Public Health Association presents a Lasker Award for 1951 to Alcoholics Anonymous in recognition of is unique and highly successful approach to that age-old public health and social problem, alcoholism.

Since its founding sixteen years ago, Alcoholics Anonymous has brought recovery to more than 120,000 chronic drinkers formerly thought hopeless. Today this world fellowship of 4,000 groups, resident in 38 countries, is rehabilitating 25,000 additional persons yearly. In emphasizing alcoholism as an illness, the social stigma associated with this condition is being blotted out.

Alcoholics Anonymous works upon the novel principle that a recovered alcoholic can reach and treat a fellow sufferer as no one else can. In so doing, the recovered alcoholic maintains his own sobriety; the man he treats soon becomes a physician to the next new applicant, thus creating an ever expanding chain reaction of liberation, with patients welded together by bonds of common suffering, common understanding, and stimulating action in a great cause.

This is not a reform movement, nor is it operated by professionals who are concerned with the problem. It is financed by voluntary contributions of its members, all of whom remain anonymous. There are no dues, no paid therase pists, no paid professional workers. It enjoys the good will and often the warm endorsement of many medical and scientific groups - no mean achievement in itself for any organization run entirely by laymen.

Historians may one day point to Alcoholics Anonymous as a society which did far more than achieve a considerable measure of success with alcoholism and its stigma; they may recognize Alcoholics Anonymous to have been a great venture with social pioneering which forged a new instrument for social action; a new therapy based on the kinship of common suffering; one having a vast potential for the myriad other ills of mankind.

The Tenth Tradition ...

Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy.

My Tenth Tradition Checklist ...

- 1. Do I ever give the impression that there really is an "AA opinion" on Antabuse? Tranquilizers? Doctors? Psychiatrists? Churches? Hospitals? Jails? Alcohol? The federal or state government? Legalizing marijuana? Vitamins? Al-Anon? Alateen?
- 2. Can I honestly share my own personal experience concerning any of these without giving the impression I am stating the "AA opinion?"
- 3. What in AA history gave rise to our Tenth Tradition?
- 4. Have I had a similar experience in my own AA life?
- 5. What would AA be without this Tradition? Where would I be?
- 6. Do I breach this or any of its supporting Traditions in subtle, perhaps unconscious, ways?
- 7. How can I manifest the spirit of this Tradition in my personal life outside AA? Inside AA?
